Welcome

Dear Site Coordinator.

On behalf of Go To College Nevada, we would like to thank you for your decision to participate in a College Decision Day event. Our main focus is to celebrate seniors who are deciding to further their education by attending a postsecondary institution and encourage the younger generation of students to prepare early for college. This day also includes those students who have decided to enlist in the armed forces or enter career training. These events are part of a national effort through organizations such as the American College Application Campaign and Better Make Room/Reach Higher.

Nevada's College Decision Day encourages and ensures that students are taking the necessary steps to enroll in the school they choose to attend. The day will consist of high school seniors participating in a celebration of their commitment to attend the institution/path of their choosing. Students of all grades should be encouraged to attend the event. Ultimately this will create a college-going culture throughout your high school, because they see the success and excitement of the graduating seniors. Events can be small or large, whatever you decide.

College Decision Day is held annually between late April and early June. This should be around the time that all seniors have received an answer letter of acceptance from the schools in which they have applied. College Decision Day models after the National College Signing Day for student athletes who announce their commitment to playing on a college team. By modifying the National College Signing Day model, we are giving all students the chance to be recognized for their acceptance into college, the military or a career training program.

ABOUT COLLEGE DECISION DAY

College Decision Day is the last step in the Go To College Nevada college journey initiative. By now, students should have participated in College Application Month and FAFSA Completion or events similar to these. This day is not only a celebration for all students who have been admitted to postsecondary education and those who have decided to enlist in the armed forces, but also to establish and/or reinforce the college-going culture throughout your school. Below you will find several tools that can be used before and after college decision day to host the perfect event and keep the tradition for years to come.

Why Host College Decision Day?

- To recognize ALL graduating seniors for their postsecondary plans.
- To remind seniors to make a decision about the school they wish to attend before required deadlines.
- To support the decision that they have made.
- To create a college-going culture for other classes.
- To finish the academic school year with success!

Expectations of Host Sites

- Recognize ALL seniors for their commitment to postsecondary decision whether that be two-year or four year institution, military or trade school.
- Ideally, the celebration should be done in front of the entire student body but if
 that is not practical, other options are fine. For example, a College Wall where
 students can write where they will attend. If it is in a common area, the whole
 school can see it. Other suggestions are assemblies, luncheons, etc.
- If you are holding a large event, you can contact local media, school board
 officials and politicians in efforts to attend and bring publicity to the event.

PLANNING CHECKLIST

 Ask teachers to remind students to bring their acceptance letters on the day of the event. The keynote speaker could be a school board trustee or a college representative and should reinforce the importance of creating a college-going culture. After You Have Planned Your Event Distribute flyers for College Decision Day to the student body. ☐ Remind them that although this is for graduating seniors, all students are encouraged to attend (if applicable). ☐ Remind students to have their parents participate in their celebration. ☐ Confirm with each student what school they will be attending. Upload flyer on school's social media ☐ Using the hashtags #ImGoingToCollege, #CollegeDecisionDay, #GoToCollegeNV Confirm all attendees ☐ Teachers, administrators, university or college representatives, and keynote speaker should all be confirmed and prepared for College Decision Day. □ Follow up with potential media coverage and their attendance in the event. Ensure event supplies are ready ☐ Printed certificates, printed student roster, decorations, and music. Make a program for College Decision Day ☐ Include times for introduction, keynote speaker, when food will be served, and when students will be recognized for deciding the school they will attend. Also, include a list of the certificates that will be given. Reinforce the college-going culture ☐ Remind teachers, students, and administrators to wear college clothing on event day and to decorate classrooms with college logos. Day of College Decision Day Remember to take pictures during College Decision Day. ☐ Create a hashtag for the event or use #ImGoingToCollege or #CollegeDecisionDay, and ask students to use it when they upload a picture on social media ☐ Upload pictures to school websites. ☐ Tag Go to College Nevada on social media posts so we can share too and further create a college-going culture, @gotocollegenv (Twitter and Instagram). • Send thank you notes to all team members, volunteers, quests, etc. ☐ It is important to keep those connections for future college-going events. ☐ Send letters to students and their families thanking them for their participation. Remind them of any tasks they #TAPPLIFD need to complete during the summer before attending

Section II: Student Resources

Senior Checklist

Colleges and universities typically ask for a response from students around the month of May. Before having students attend College Decision Day, there are necessary steps students will need to take before committing to the school they will attend for their post-secondary education.

Here are some tips to recommend to students before and after College Decision Days.

- Talk to your family, teachers, counselors, mentors, and college coordinators to help make your decision.
- Finalize your decision by looking for the best fit for your college career.
- Understand the financial cost of all the institutions you have applied to.
- Review your FAFSA award package for the school you wish to attend.
 - o Find out how much you will receive for the school year.
 - Check any scholarships that you have received that can help you pay for your tuition.
- Accept your admissions! Pay attention to any deadlines! If the school has an online portal, login and check for communications from the school. You should also check your email for status updates.
- Be sure to decline other offers of admissions from institutions you have decided not to attend.
- Review your enrollment letter. Follow any directions and steps that have been given by the institution to officially enroll.
- Enroll in a university email, this way you can stay in the know of all events and requirements that you will need before your semester starts.
- If you have any family, friends, or mentors that have helped you succeed in school, invite them to attend College Decision Day.

Plan Ahead! It's never too early to be fully prepared for your first semester of college.

- Register for your college orientation
- Request a copy of your final high school transcript be sent to your college.
- After successfully enrolling, check out any summer opportunities that are available to you. Be sure to sign up for mandatory programming.
- Don't let the summer bring down your motivation! Stay active! Find clubs or organizations that you can join! Check for available resources on campus.
- Sit down with your college advisor and talk about your college goals.
 - Look over the classes you will be required to take.
 - Does your college require a separate acceptance to your desired program of study? If yes, plan ahead by setting goals for you to achieve acceptance into that program.
 - If you are undecided about a major, do a little research about your top choices and try to select or at least narrow down your choices.
- Update your resume with the current school you will be attending to use for future academic or employment endeavors.
- Enjoy your first semester of college! Keep setting goals for yourself as you
 experience freshman year of college.

Steps to Take for Students Who Haven't Enrolled in College

College Decision Day is a celebration of all the work that students have put into getting accepted into the college of their choice. As you approach the day of your event remind yourself that not all students have been able to successfully enroll into the college of their choice. Some students will have pending replies from schools that they have applied for admission. Others will find themselves lost as to where they would like to apply and have not yet submitted an application. Below are some scenarios that you may encounter as you get answers from students on admittance letters from colleges and what you can do to implement a college-going culture in your school.

Scenario #1:

Student has started their application, but has not yet submitted it, making it incomplete.

- Meet with student and discuss their goals for post-secondary education.
- Explore other schools that have a late registration date such as community colleges or a state college.
- •Identify what is needed to complete the application for admittance.
- •Remind the student that it is not too late to apply, but they must turn in everything in a timely manner to be fully admitted.

Scenario #2

Student has turned in a complete application, but has not been admitted.

- Meet with student and look at other postsecondary options available to them.
- •If the school has an online portal, tell the student to login and check for communications from the school. They should also check their email for status updates.
- Encourage student to follow up with the school by emailing the admissions office.
- Give the student the option to meet with the college representative at College Decision Day to see what they can do to meet the admission requirements of the school.

Scenario #3

Student is unsure of the school they will choose to attend.

- Encourage students to talk to parents, mentor or teachers about their decision.
- Meet with students to talk about their concerns about fully committing to that school.
- Assist with any help that can motivate the student to decide on what college they will attend.
- Have the student meet with college representative at College Decision Day to help the determine what school they want to attend.



Sample Letter to the Parent

In the beginning of the school year we helped seniors apply to college during College Application Month and we provided guidance in completing the FAFSA. Now it is time to celebrate their success!

Please join us on this special day by accompanying your student to College Decision Day!

All senior students are expected to attend and encouraged to wear a t-shirt of their college selection. School administrators, teachers, college representatives and the entire student body are invited to join the celebration.

Sample Student and Family Follow-up Letter

Dear Students and Family,

Thank you for your participation in College Decision Day! Your presence and encouragement have set the college-going culture in our school for years to come. Congratulations on making one of the biggest decisions in your college career! As you enter your first semester of college here are some tips you should consider before school starts. We wish you success and hope you are fully prepared for your freshman semester.

- •Read over the enrollment directions your school has given you. Most schools will require you to go through a list of steps to secure your enrollment. This will most likely consist of logging into the college's official website to officially declare acceptance. If you need any help or guidance, don't hesitate and reach out to the school admissions office.
- Request your final high school official transcript to be sent to your college. Make sure all other required documents are sent in as well. This could be test scores, essays, immunization records, etc.
- •Declare a major! Your college official website will likely ask you to declare your major when you submit your application or upon your acceptance. If you are undecided about the major you want to declare it is okay to declare undecided. As you venture out into your college career your advisor and instructors will help you to decide on the major that best fits your interests.
- •Colleges and Universities will often require a monetary deposit to officially enroll into classes or on-campus housing. Often this fee is added to your tuition and fees. Check your student account to verify all fees and due dates. If you need aid to pay your enrollment fee, contact the financial aid office to know when you will be receiving your financial aid. Not all fees are covered by financial aid so you need to be aware of those fees.
- •If you have graduated from a Nevada High School and you plan on attending a Nevada System of Higher Education public institution (UNLV, UNR, NSC, CSN, GBC, TMCC, or WNC), make sure to check your residency status. If you are classified as an out-of-state student, you will need to correct this to have out-of-state tuition and fees removed from your account. If your residency status is listed incorrectly, contact the Admissions Office for guidance on how to make the correction.
- Verify that your school has received your FAFSA application. Read over your Student Aid Report (SAR) this will include all the grants, scholarships and loans that you have been awarded. If you have any questions regarding your financial aid do NOT wait until last minute to reach your school's financial aid office. As the beginning of the new semester approaches financial aid offices tend to get an overwhelming amount of students in their offices. To have your issues resolved before the semester starts make sure to reach out to them as soon as possible.
- •Accept any grants, scholarships or loans that you have been awarded through your Student Aid Report (SAR). Some grants and scholarships will require you to accept before they are applied towards your overall cost.

- •If you are a student who will be living on campus review the housing plan. Find the dorm that best fits your cost and needs. Some colleges will require you to live in a specific dorm facility because you are a first year student. Decide on a meal plan that best fits your cost and preference. Colleges will always have a dining common to provide students with the nutritious meals. Often the meal plan will be something that is also required by the school that you will be attending.
- •Review the calendar for orientation days! Decide on the one that will best fit your schedule and sign up for that session. Orientation is an event put on by your school to welcome you to their campus and guide you through a successful first year.
- •Schedule an appointment to meet with your advisor. Review the classes that you should take during your first semester of college. Talk about your major and any information regarding to your career. Set goals with your advisor for your college career. If available, use a planner to plan out your program of study. These may be an online tool within your student portal.
- •If you have been put into a remedial class. Look over the dates you can take placement tests for the classes that you need.
- Jump start your college career! It's never too early to be involved in organizations on your campus. Explore what your school has to offer over the summer and take advantage of those opportunities. Some schools require summer programming for first-year students. Be sure to sign up!
- •Stay motivated through the summer! Don't let the summer heat melt you into not beginning your first semester of college! Here are some tips on what you can decide before your first day of college.
 - Talk about your college dreams, plans and fears to your friends, family and people you trust. Turn your plans into goals, your fears into an obstacle you will overcome and your dreams into a reality.
 - How will you get to college? Figure out how you will commute from campus to home.
 - If you live on campus, meet-up with your roommate and brainstorm ideas on how you will decorate your room.
 - o Get a summer job or internship. Stay PRO-ACTIVE!
 - Help your family understand the journey on which you are about to embark.
 College is not just a life change for you, but your family as well.

Sample Overview for Teachers, Staff, and Community Members

We are excited to announce that (insert high school name) will be participating in College Decision Day. To ensure that this day is successfully executed we need your assistance and creativity! To make this experience as rewarding to students and families we need your help by promoting and coordinating fun activities for a successful College Decision Day.

What is College Decision Day?

College Decision Day takes the same format of the NCAA's National Signing Day where student athletes get to announce the school for which they plan to attend and play a sport. We believe that every student should be celebrated for their admittance into a postsecondary education institution whether that be a community college or university. College Decision Day also celebrates those who have decided to enlist in the armed forces and the respective branch in which they will serve.

The purpose of College Decision Day is not only to celebrate the graduating seniors, but to establish a college going culture throughout our student body. This is why we need your help. Throughout the event, we ask that teachers, administrators and all staff participate in various college going activities.

What happens during College Decision Day?

Through the planning of your Site Coordinator, you will be provided a date and time in which College Decision Day will take place. During that day the students will be celebrated for accepting their enrollment into the school of their choice. To make this day much more meaningful and establish a college going culture for years to come, we need your creativity.

How can I help?

If you wish to participate in the overall planning of College Decision Day at your school reach out to your Site Coordinator (Insert Name) to help with the event. Your contribution can be guiding the students through the week of College Decision Day. This can be an entire spirit week and celebration of students going to college. We want all students of all grade levels exposed to a college going culture. Ideas for Celebrating College Decision Day With Community Members

College Decision Day will look very different for all high schools. Our main goal is celebrate the students and create a college going culture. To do this, plan an event that will be the best fit for students and community members. Always keep in mind that it is important to have staff and teachers on board to participate throughout the week of College Decision Day. Here are some tips on activities and events that you can host leading up to your College Decision Day.

Celebrate your seniors and families by acknowledging their decision to enroll in college.

<u>Create a College Wall:</u> Use a bulletin board in the school to celebrate the letters of enrollment that have been received by your seniors. Have students write the names of the colleges they have received acceptance too on a piece of construction paper along with their name. Post that paper on the wall for the community to see. For students who are not graduating have students write on the paper potential schools they see as colleges they will attend too.

<u>College T-shirt/Sweater Day:</u> An easy and fun way to generate some excitement in your school by hosting college t-shirt or sweatshirt day. Get everyone involved-students, staff, administrators! Plan to host this event during the week of College Decision Day.

<u>Door Decorating Contest:</u> Teachers, administrators and staff can participate in a door decorating contest. In which they will post their "Ask Me!" Form and decorate their door according to the school that they attended. Students will then vote on who has the best decorated door.

Morning Announcement: Generate excitement by highlighting different colleges and universities during morning announcements the weeks leading up to your event. Students, staff, community or representatives from colleges can do the announcements. Make the morning announcements exciting by providing students further knowledge of the school they picked and one interesting fact.

<u>Graduate Parade:</u> Graduates dress in their cap and gown and then parade down the halls in a local elementary school. This is a fun event that shares the excitement with younger students, much to their delight!

<u>Friday Night Lights</u>: Set up informational table at your high school's football game to make students and families aware and excited for College Decision Day. Provide information for those students who have not yet applied for college and encourage them to apply as soon as possible.

Bring a Guest Speaker to your Classroom

Have a guest speaker come to your class to get students more excited about College Decision Day. The guest speaker should provide support and encouragement for establishing a college going culture in our school.

Engage Underclassmen into College Decision Day

The earlier students begin thinking about college the better. Have your underclassmen participate in the activities below by listing the school they wish to apply for admission during their senior year of high school. This is a great way to ensure students are prepared when it's their time to apply to college! Here are some information sessions and activities you can implement with your underclassmen to establish a college going culture among them at an early stage of their high school career. Motivate your students to evaluate the list below as they go on to the next grade level.

- 9th Grade: Create strong study habits, learning styles and decision making skills. Familiarize students with their transcript and set an academic plan for them. Show them how to find career information related to their interests. Connect them with schools that offer the career they wish to pursue and how to enroll when the time comes. Teach them how to search for and apply for a scholarship. It's never too early to apply for a scholarship. There are scholarships offered to underclassmen during their high school career.
- 10th Grade: Check progress on the academic plan that you have established for them. Encourage them to do extracurricular activities to enhance their resume which they may use when applying for scholarships. Inform them of any opportunity for them to earn college credit (i.e., dual credit and/or AP courses) and how it may give them a jump start in college by applying these credits to their degree. Motivate them to prepare for their PSAT or any other upcoming test.
- 11th Grade: Have the students create a plan to research and determine what
 college or universities they will like to apply. Review the admission requirements for
 all colleges or universities they have selected. Find scholarships for which they can
 apply. Write personal statements and essays for applications. It's never too early to
 prepare to go to college!

Donation Request

If your school doesn't provide you with all the resources needed for College Decision Day, we encourage you to reach out to local businesses and organizations in your community to sponsor your event by providing anything that you might need. Here are some tips on how to get sponsored by local businesses.

Contact potential donors by visiting them in person, call or emailing. Make sure to be specific in the items that you need the most and how they can help the school celebrate College Decision Day. Here are some suggested items that could be sponsored through local businesses or organizations

- Food and drinks for all attendees. Including students, families, faculty and volunteers.
- Giveaway items such as:
 - Gift cards, school supplies, collegiate gear from the schools that students will attend.
- •T-shirts to be worn for the event.
- Discounts at participating stores. For example, any fast food location in which they would give a discount to students for participating in College Decision Day

Organizations and business are often interested in sponsoring educational initiatives because it is for the betterment of students, families, and the community. If you find yourself limited in the resources that your school provides to you, don't be discouraged. Reach out to your community. Start by explaining the importance of holding such events and how they can help out our students and our community. Finish by thanking them for their help and desire to encourages students to reach their education and career goals.

 - o Including those who enlisted in the military.
- How many higher education institutions are students attending?
- •Is this an event that you would like to host next year?
